We felt they would be an awesome fit!" said Melissa.

Our girls have grown up at WKYC, and have enjoyed being, in their words, "junior-junior counselors" for Ricky and Melissa! We grew close to the Collins family over the years and were thrilled when they asked us to help continue the great traditions they developed. We look forward to continuing their work of helping campers and their families acclimate to WKYC," said Landon.

When asked what they hope campers and families will take away from the session, Clark said he hopes that campers grow in their love for the Lord and learn to love WKYC. For the parents in attendance, he hopes they not only learn more about WKYC, but also "...understand that their children will be safe in an environment where they can learn more about God and grow friendships that will last a lifetime."

"And, since my Dad works in the kitchen, everyone will leave Pee Wee Weekend well-fed!"

Clark added that "The Board and the weekly session directors have done a fabulous job over the years in creating unique opportunities for our youth to engage in a spirituallyfulfilling experience at WKYC. From the all-ages weeks to age-specific weeks, there is a place for our young people and congregations to find a home at WKYC. Our job at Pee Wee Weekend is to light a spark that will continue to glow increasingly as the campers grow and mature in their faith. If a camper starts at age 4 and continues through high school, they will have 15 years of experience at WKYC, and words cannot express how much potential those lessons and friendships can have on the future of the church."

The Clarks are looking forward to meeting all of the campers and their families during Pee Wee Weekend 2024! They are currently hard at work planning and assembling their staff, and hope that all those involved in the coming years will love WKYC as much as they do.
